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US Ag Centers Offer Videos and Resources to Promote National Farm Safety Week, Sept. 15-21

Agricultural producers are tough, intelligent and resourceful! For decades, farmers have turned to the US Ag Centers for information on how to stay safe and healthy while providing food and fiber for our country. Educators, employers, extension agents, trade association leaders and other industry stakeholders will also find helpful and entertaining videos to "Shift Farm Safety into High Gear" --the theme for this year's National Farm Safety and Health Week, Sept. 15-21.

The 11 U.S. Agricultural Centers, funded by the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), have produced safety and health videos related to agriculture, forestry and fishing. The videos, many in both English and Spanish, can be used informally or integrated into a formal training program to keep people safe and healthy as they work or visit agricultural sites. Popular topics include grain bin entry procedures, pesticide safety, chainsaw operation, dairy cattle safety and tractor rollover prevention.

Agriculture is among our most hazardous industries, with a work-related death rate of 23 deaths per 100,000 workers annually, according to the most recent numbers from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, far ahead of transportation (15.1/100,000) and mining (12.9/100,000). In addition, mental health issues and high rates of farmer suicide have been shaking up rural America and garnering recent attention in the media.

<u>NIOSH</u> joins the Ag Centers in recognizing National Farm Safety and Health Week as an opportunity to emphasize the importance of working together to prevent injuries and illnesses among agricultural workers.
