CONNECTING PEOPLE TO IMPROVE

Connecting people with information related to health and safety in agriculture is of primary importance to UMASH. This not only includes people working in agriculture, but the many more people whose lives are touched each day by agriculture. This issue of The UMASH Connection highlights the variety of information available through UMASH and its partners.

In our upcoming Annual Forum on May 28th we will partner with the University of Wisconsin Eau Claire, South Central College, and Agrisafe to focus on agricultural health and safety in education. The Migrant Clinician Network has been a leader in producing high quality educational materials for Spanish speaking populations. Their series of Spanish webinars will expand their reach to this population. UMASH has produced a series of videos and fact sheets for people working in animal agriculture to prevent needlestick injuries; a common, but under-recognized injury with potentially serious consequences.

The growth of agritourism is connecting more and more people directly with agriculture and allowing them to better understand where their food comes from. With that comes the opportunity for them to learn about the health and safety issues related to agriculture, including protecting themselves. The National Farm Medicine Center has been a leader in promoting health and safety in agritourism and the Minnesota Department of Health is also supporting these efforts through science and educational opportunities.

We are also pleased to announce our annual call for proposals for pilot projects. These grants have fostered a number of new research, education, and outreach programs across the Upper Midwest.

UMASH PILOT PROJECTS CALL FOR PROPOSALS



UMASH is requesting applications for small grants ranging from \$5,000 to a maximum of \$20,000 to address health and safety issues related to agricultural workers and their families.

UMASH is specifically interested in projects that address concepts outlined in the NIOSH National Occupational Research Agenda (NORA) for agriculture and in the NORA strategic goals, integrates the philosophy of a One Health model into agricultural safety and health, while also addressing issues important to the agriculture industry in the Upper Midwest.

This announcement is open to investigators working in academic, government, community, industry or health care settings who have the knowledge, skills, and ability to carry out the proposed work.

INTEGRATING SAFETY IN AGRITOURISM

UMASH investigators, Carrie Klumb and Kirk Smith from the Minnesota Department of Health, serve as advisors on this project.

Marsha Salzwedel Honored by National Agritourism Association

A national survey of agritourism operators conducted by the National Children's Center for Rural and Agricultural Health and Safety guided major updates to "Integrating Safety into Agritourism" (www.safeagritourism.com), and provided new information on activities offered by operators and the safety resources they desire.

National Children's Center Project Manager for Agritourism Marsha Salzwedel announced the website's upgrades at the North American Farm Direct Marketing Association (NAFDMA) Convention, held Feb. 1-6 in Nashville and Knoxville, Tenn.

"As agritourism continues to grow in popularity, implementing safety strategies to help maximize fun and minimize liability is increasingly important," Salzwedel said.

Safety took center-stage at the convention when NAFDMA Executive Director Charlie Touchette presented Salzwedel the organization's "Outstanding Leadership" award. Salzwedel credited the entire Children's Center team for the long-term, mutually beneficial relationship with NAFDMA.

NEW Needlestick Prevention Video


UMASH recently produced a needlestick prevention video featuring tips on proper techniques to avoid needlestick injuries, and what to do if you are accidentally stuck.
